

White Linseed Soap Finish DESCRIPTION

White pigmented Linseed soap is used to lighten up and treat untreated wood floors indoors such as ash, birch, pine, and spruce. White Linseed Soap Finish give different results depending on the surface.

The soap is environmentally friendly, efficient, and biodegradable, handcrafted by Allbäck Linseed Oil Products. We have developed a recipe that results in a soap of the highest quality, without additives.

The timber quality of the floor is crucial for a beautiful soap scrubbed floor. The boards should be of high quality with the heart of the wood facing upwards. Keep this in mind when choosing a new floor!

Soap scrubbing step by step

- Sand the floor with 120–240 sandpaper, finer sandpaper gives less color absorption. Vacuum the wooden floor thoroughly before you start scrubbing.
- Wet the floor with cold water.
- Shake well before use. Mix 1–2 dl of soap with 0.5 L of cold water in a clean bucket. When soap scrubbing a very dry wooden floor use twice the amount of soap. For the best protection repeat the treatment 2–4 times. Each time you soap scrub the floor, it will become brighter, and the protection will get better and better.
- Scrub in the longitudinal direction of the boards and a few boards at a time with a scrubbing brush on a handle. For heavily stained areas, put concentrated soap directly on the brush.
- Rinse / wipe the floor with a damp cloth about 15min afterwards, let dry.

Notes

- Never use White Linseed Soap finish directly on dry wood as it may cause stains.
- NOTE! Warm water makes the wood grey.
- After the first scrubbing, the wood fiber might rise. If so, sand the floor again before continuing treatment.
- The floor needs to be scrubbed 1-2 times a year to build up a durable surface.
- Use regular Linseed Soap for wet drying of normally dirty floors.
